ALL CHANGE: Are you ready?

Egged on by family members and business associates, I have abandoned my five-year-old but reliable Acer PC in favour of a tiny, shiny Apple MacBook computer. Everyone said I'd be sure to like it. When it all works, it runs like a gem. But since taking it out of the box six

weeks ago, life has, at times, felt like 'hell on earth'.

In the middle of all this I went to the Lechlade Community Cinema for the film 'I, Daniel Blake', Ken Loach's take on Britain's benefit system. It was the technology thrown at the lead character by the social security system that made the biggest impression on me. I've been blessed with a technical education and have used computers and gadgets a lot. If I was struggling with the PC/Mac conversion, how on earth would a carpenter in his 60s, who'd never used a computer, be able to login, let alone fill in the complex online claim forms?

So, what have I learned from this experience? This applies to any technology really.

It's an inescapable fact that we find it harder to adapt to change as we get older. Even 'technical' people find change difficult and frustrating. If you know a younger person willing to be your wingman, enlist them immediately.

The bigger the change (and I'd include the PC/Mac here) the more you need to allow for things to go wrong – and, believe me, they will. That means giving it plenty of time to install and overcome the seemingly endless glitches. Take stock of all the equipment you use and what you do with it. List it all and get advice about how it will all fit together. Your budget must allow for replacements and upgrades. And you might need to allow for expert technical assistance to get it all running. It's surprising how the cost and time escalate while confidence drains away.

Perhaps the most important question is whether *you* are ready for the change. People who easily follow intuition will probably feel at home quickly with modern technologies. Whereas people like me (an irritating engineer who needs to know how something works) may well make a meal of it.

We were really pleased that so many people came to the opening event; it really was a great community occasion.'

The crowds were entertained throughout the day,

starting with an energetic Zumba session led by Fitness with Pippa, followed by an excellent show by Cirencester Creative Dance Academy who showcased their singing, ballet, contemporary dance and cheerleading talents.

Meanwhile, in the café area, village group Singing for

Fun and Ann Edwards school choir and bell ringing group treated visitors to a wonderful array of musical delights.

Rhian Gardiner, Manager of Fenton's, said: 'There was such an amazing turnout. We were really pleased with the show of support from the community and everyone was really positive about the centre.'

The café 'Coffee at Fenton's' is open 9am-4pm, Monday-Saturday, and 10am-3pm on Sundays. Recently they have added soft seating and a children's play area indoors, as well as tables and chairs

outside overlooking the pond. Over the past few weeks, a team of 30 dedicated volunteers have worked tirelessly to complete the planting and landscaping around the hall and this week work began on the playground adjacent to the building.

Thank you to Katherine Isles who organised the day and to everyone who has worked behind the scenes to make this such a wonderful space for our community.

Wildlife Notes by 'Chiff Chaff'

The Blackthorn on The Dance has put on a magnificent display this year. The flowers of purest white were not only a delight for winter-jaded humans but a valuable source of energy for early flying insects. Later as the flowers fade, leaves and fresh new shoots will appear on the shrubs, appetising fare for the grubs and caterpillars of the species, (numbering well over a hundred) that use the Blackthorn as a food plant.



On The Dance we cut a proportion of the Blackthorn each year, in order to produce the soft Spring growth which is favourable for insect larva. Most desirable of all would be to attract Brown Hair Streak butterflies. (the female lays her eggs exclusively on Blackthorn), a species which is found on a number of local sites, but is nationally very uncommon. Of course, the dense almost impenetrable thickets of older shrubs are also important as places in which small birds like Wrens, Blackcaps and Whitethroats feel secure enough to nest.

Blackthorns bear bluish-black fruits called Sloes in the Autumn and together with its near relative the

Cherry-Plum. is one of the ancestor species of all commercially grown plums.

But in ancient folklore Blackthorn was greatly feared as the old black crone of the woods and a vestige of this may remain in the still current superstition that it is unlucky to bring it into the house. Its hard, dense wood is ideal for walking sticks, staves

and clubs and it is the traditional wood for shillelaghs and the Black Rod, carried by the Parliamentary official.



Cricklade Garden Club: Clematis

There was a great turnout for the March meeting when Marcel Floyd treated us to a humorous and informative talk on 'Clematis'.

Taking us through the correct pruning for the three groups he informed us that group 3 can be hard pruned in February as they flower on the new season's growth but recommended leaving C. Tangutica until there is some growth showing; if you forget to prune this group, blooms will become higher and higher but you can always give it the Chelsea chop in May!

Marcel also said that if you like your C. Armandii to flower high up, you could use the bare lower stems to support another clematis.

Whilst deeper blooms will be enhanced by sunlight Marcel advised dappled shade to avoid bleaching paler flowers.

Good Old Geraniums

Geraniums are hardworking and hard to beat. They flower at a variety of heights often for long periods, are great at filling gaps and some even scramble through and up their neighbour; often producing delightful combinations.

A favourite of mine, G. albanum, is a pretty sprawler; at the end of February, in a mild year, a new mound of rounded, deeply-cut green leaves with pink stems emerges. During May, these leaves are topped with a foam of lavender-pink, veined flowers fading as they age giving a multi-coloured effect.

Plant it next to a magenta G. sanguineum and Erysimum Bowles Mauve and it will take you through

G. albanum and G. sanguineum

June beautifully. It will tolerate light shade but prefers a sunny and well-drained spot, so mine grows in a raised bed, weaving up and tumbling over the wall.

The taller G. phaeum can reach over 60cm in a shady spot, erect flower stems topping its mounds of dark foliage. It flowers in a range of colours, from white to deep purple, sometimes having pale centres. It often cross pollinates producing some lovely hues. Its silvergrey flowers look great with the drooping pink Dicentra Formosa and purple Aquilegias.

The darkest G. pheaum can be brightened by the clear blue flowers of the equally robust Brunnera macrophylla with large, bright green leaves.

Cut back to the ground as they begin to look tatty, water and feed them and they will soon produce a fresh mound of leaves, frequently followed by more blooms.

Perfect!

Spring-clean your home in 15 minutes

There's something quite lovely about carrying out a spring clean isn't there? No? Just us then!

FENTON'S COMMUNITY CENTRE: The Fenton's Community Centre in Teal Way had a very popular opening event on Saturday 18th March, when Raymond Fenton's grandchildren cut the ribbon to declare the new facility officially open. The Parish Council wishes to thank all those involved, particularly Katharine Isles for organising the day. Redrow have also commenced installation of their playground equipment on land next to Fenton's and this should be completed very soon.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN: The Neighbourhood Plan steering group staged its first public consultation event at Fenton's on Saturday 25th March, and presented the results of the recent household questionnaire. Over 150 people attended during the day to browse the information and discuss the results, and were also treated to a display of photos of South Cerney down the years. The Parish Council wishes to thank all those who came along, and those who have assisted with bringing the plan process this far. Members of the steering group were ably assisted on the day by staff from Gloucestershire Rural Community Council, who had provided advice and consultancy services.

PAWS ON PATROL & DOG WALKING: The Paws On Patrol scheme is a positive adjunct to the established neighbourhood watch scheme and local community policing in the village. Paws On Patrol is using dog owners and their dogs whilst they are out and about walking their dogs. South Cerney has a high level of community spirited dog owners who have established a camaraderie and support for each other. Dog owners already network with each other and recognise if individuals in the village are absent from usual routines and check on their well-being. The majority of dog owners use the poop a scoop bins throughout the village and clear up after their dog

whether on pavements, footpaths or in fields.

A launch event for the scheme is being held at Fenton's in Teal Way on **Sunday 14th May** from 10am until 2pm. Come along and find out what it's all about. Further information may also be found elsewhere in this edition of Cerney News.

Dog walkers are also asked that they keep to public footpaths when walking their pets and not allow them to roam across fields and other private land.

The hare duly arrived and she then set about transforming it according to her brief. It took two weeks to plan and a month to complete while nine-month-old daughter Sophia looked on. 

'When I hear someone sigh, 'Life is hard', I'd like to say, 'Compared to what?'

If they didn't know it already, pet owners soon discover that animals have complex needs and it's their duty of care to understand them. As with many things in life we may need help, especially if the problem is a behavioural one.

If you have a 'Rescue' dog or cat from organisations like Blue Cross or the RSPCA, it's worth a phone call to them as they will usually have a trained member of staff on their team. With Marley, who was aged five when I adopted him from the Blue Cross at Burford. had to make one or two phone calls during the first few weeks and the behaviourist's advice was very re-assuring. The other option is to start by consulting your vet because it may be worth them carrying out an initial health check. If all is well your vet will be able to advise you of a behaviourist who has the right credentials and experience.

Ideally you should be looking for someone who is a certified clinical animal behaviourist, affiliated to organisations such as the Association for the Study of Animal Behaviour (ASAB) or the Association of Pet Behaviour Counsellors (APBC).

Then of course there is the question of the complex needs of the owner, but that's another story.

Meet Meliny Tim

Meliny grew up in Johannesburg and spent her childhood living on her parents' vegetable farm; she has early memories of going out into the fields to pick crops for their dinner.

She had a traditional Chinese upbringing where expressions were made through food and herbs. It is unsurprising that she later discovered that she had an inherent passion for food. However, it wasn't until she went to University that she realised that not everyone shared her knowledge about food and nutrition.

In 1999, Meliny completed a Batchelor's Degree in Commerce and came to the UK to work for manufacturing company Loadpoint Ltd in Cricklade, before moving onto Corin in Cirencester. It was through her role as a

manager that she discovered that she loved mentoring people and came to realise that many of her conversations centred around food and nutrition. Consequently, Meliny took the decision to retrain as a nutritionist in 2010.

You may remember, in June 2014, the government issued new school food standards which included putting cooking and food education into the curriculum as an entitlement for all children in Primary School. At the same time Meliny, along with her business partner Emily Bird, was setting up a new business. In September 2014, The Kitchen Club was formed – a pop-up kitchen which travels to schools to teach children to 'Learn to cook, eat well for life!'

Schools were required to implement Cooking and Nutrition as part of their curriculum. However, in

reality many found they lacked the resources; a number of local schools therefore enlisted the services of The Kitchen Club. Meliny and her team work hard to teach holistically; they provide the equipment,

ingredients and integrate food hygiene, food providence and nutritional understanding into their classes. I have witnessed Meliny cooking with a group of young people and it is a remarkable sight; her enthusiasm and passion for food is infectious and you can't help but feel inspired.

The things that Meliny is involved in mirror her love for teaching children and the joy of seeing them engage and be amazed with all that there is still to learn about life; about God; about who they are eventually going to become. She is involved with Beaver Scouts, which she feels is
